



RECTOR'S RAMBLINGS

I wrote about the commemorations of the 75th anniversary of D-Day in my July Rector's Ramblings, and as Remembrance Sunday approaches I find myself thinking about them again, as well as casting my mind back to the 50th anniversary commemorations.

Back in 1994 I was a vicar in Mottingham in South East London. Henry, a member of my congregation, had been part of the crew of a Motor Torpedo Boat in operation on D-Day. His boat was sunk, and floating in the water waiting to be rescued, Henry swallowed heavy oil that stayed in his lungs for the rest of his life. On the 50th anniversary of D-Day the Regional Council of Normandy awarded medals to veterans who had taken part in the landings. Henry's health meant that he was unable to make the journey to Caen to pick up his medal and asked me if I could collect it for him when I went to France for my summer holiday – which I gladly did.

At the presentation I found it very moving standing there among veterans and also people of my generation picking the medal up on behalf of family members. When the mayor pinned the medal to my chest he said *Pour votre pere?* [*for your father?*] I replied *Oui* [*yes*], not feeling confident enough of my French to explain the whole story. But somehow I felt that my little untruth somehow conveyed a deeper truth, that I was a son of that generation and of those who had been there.

Whilst staying at Caen we made the trip to nearby Bayeux to see the tapestry. It struck me that 50 years ago an invasion force had crossed the Channel one way and that 900 years ago another invasion force had crossed the channel going the other way and that somehow, though separated by time, these events were connected to each other and that also somehow the medal had connected me to them.

I say separated by time, but in what sense does time separate us from what we call the past, or for that matter the future? We tend to think of time as a straight line, something that passes and flows like a river, as in the words of the hymn O God our help in ages past which we will sing again on Remembrance Sunday this month: *time like an ever rolling stream bears all its sons away.*

For Einstein, 200 years after that hymn was written, time was more like a river that speeds up and slows down as it meanders through the universe, even bending back on itself. Time has become something that scientists aren't so certain about any more.

Professor Stephen Hawking, who died last year, wrote a book called *A Brief history of Time*, which along with the Bible remains one of the most bought and least read books of all time! In it he wrote this:

What is the nature of time? Will it ever come to an end? Can we go back in time? . . . Only time (whatever that may be) will tell.

And Professor Brian Cox, presenter of a number of television documentaries, said in the one he made about the nature of time:

But what is time? We might not be in a position in this moment of time with our current understanding of nature to even understand what we are asking.

Though all this may seem strange, what scientists are actually telling us is that the present is connected to the past (and to the future) in ways that we are only just beginning to comprehend. The past isn't simply borne away simply to vanish, as a dream dies at the opening day, as the hymn puts it. I think there's an important spiritual message there as well and it's to do with what I experienced on my trip to Caen and Bayeux. We are connected to the past, to the events and people that are part of it, in a very real way.

November is all about remembering the past. It begins with All Souls when we remember those we have loved but are no longer with us, moves through Remember, remember the fifth of November on to Remembrance Sunday. But remembering the past is more than not forgetting, it's remembering that all things and all people – past, present and future – are held in God's hands and remembering that ultimately, in the words that Julian of Norwich heard God say to her 600 years ago: *all will be well and all manner of things shall be well.*



WORLD WAR II AND ME

Eighty years after the outbreak of the Second World War, Father of the Council Trevor Brock remembers what it meant to him and his family.



Last month Trevor recalled the impact of the start of the war, just after his 11th birthday, and how his older brother was made a Pilot Officer and sent for training in Canada, from where his return was delayed by a case of chickenpox . . .

Having recovered, my brother arrived home. I can still remember my shock at seeing him turn up in a very smart officer's uniform, looking so young but yet so grown up. He didn't get to stay with us for long before being assigned to a new posting and from then we only saw him while on brief leave. He was on operations in a Mosquito bomber squadron. He could not tell us much but did give small details. One day he commented that the British blackout was very good, the German equally so but the French was only mediocre. From this we deduced that he had been on night operations in Germany.

On several short leaves he arrived home with his pilot in tow as the pilot lived too far away to get to his own home. Once he arrived with a very smart South African captain dressed in the SA uniform of khaki green, and on another occasion he brought a Flight Lieutenant. On D Day we didn't know where he was but several weeks later he appeared but when asked all he would tell us was that he had been 'very busy'.

In November 1944 he came home for a week and that was a very happy time for all my family. The day he had to re-join his squadron I walked with him to the station to see him off. A few days later we received a telegram telling us that Pilot Officer Brock had been killed. His plane had crashed into Leigh Hill in Dorking and he, and the pilot, had both died. My family were in shock and it opened a wound that 75 years later has still not healed. Last year I celebrated my 90th birthday and his life was cut short at just 23. He was given a large military funeral and our local Methodist church was packed. His coffin rested before the altar, draped in a Union Jack, and sitting on top was the RAF cap he had been wearing when we walked together to the station a few days earlier.

The War went on, there were some months yet to pass before the conclusion would be reached. The Americans continued to pound Germany by day and the RAF took the night shift. After visiting Coventry, and seeing the damage the Germans caused to the city, I have to confess I had little sympathy at that time for the German people.

Late in November 1944, in bed with my usual companion of that time of year (bronchitis), the sound of gunfire caused me to leap from my bed to the window. A

German Heinkel was in the sky above my house, its machine guns firing at nothing in particular. It turned northwards and in a few seconds a huge explosion shook the house. It had dropped a very large bomb in the centre of Melton – the one and only bomb in Melton for the entire war! The bomb landed in a stream only fifty yards from the district's electricity generation station, destroying a row of houses and covering a huge area with mud from the stream. A few days later, when I was better, I visited the scene. I remember the end house of Brook Street had an inverted tree protruding from the roof, its roots spread over the top of the house like very dirty spaghetti. Amazingly only one man was killed as he walked by the stream.

During these last months of the war we had a number of air crashes nearby and, because we lads knew the district so well, we could also get to the site before the police or military. On one occasion an American plane that was hardly damaged (a daylight raid probably) made a crash landing in a field. We got there to find the air crew climbing out of the plane in case it would blow up. We offered to help but could do so little. The Captain told us not to bother with the nose gunner as they knew he was dead. Another time we actually witnessed a mid-air collision between a Lancaster and a training plane, Airspeed Oxford. The Lancaster came down about 300 yards away from us, in a ball of flames. Unsurprisingly there were no survivors and even today the memory still shocks me. The last one was a German Heinkel III; it crash landed a few miles out from Melton. As we got there a very smart German officer in a black uniform jumped out and in perfect English asked us if we could take him to the nearest police station. We asked about the rest of his crew and he replied that they were too afraid to come out, believing they would be shot on sight. So we escorted him to the Police Station as he had asked. On the way he told us he had lived in England before the war and had been a student at Oxford University. He was forced to return to Germany to carry out his national service. I don't think the local police sergeant ever fully recovered from his shock as we walked in with a German officer. We never heard what happened after that.

Through the early months of 1945 the war dragged on, rationing was tighter than ever and the number of people destined never to return home grew ever higher. On VE Day my guardians allowed me to join all my friends in the town. We danced and sang (perhaps a little rowdily) until the early hours of the morning.

And afterwards? Briefly, I completed my exams at school, left home and attended Leicester University. My family moved to Yorkshire, a move I opposed as all my friends were in Leicester and Melton. The only good thing about Yorkshire was the wonderful girl I met there. We became engaged. After living in Bingley and working in Leeds and Bradford at two research laboratories I decided to go back to university and train to be a teacher. I won a place at Westminster College and studied between 1951 and 1953. Complete with maths degree, teaching diploma and the study of educational psychology I left and got married in August 1953 in Leeds to my wonderful Yorkshire girl. We went to St Ives in Cornwall for our honeymoon. On arrival we had to hand in our ration books as rationing was still in force. In September I began teaching at a school in Croydon . . . but that's another story . . .

In September we had to hastily bring our meeting day forward by a week to facilitate our speaker and consequently the number of members able to attend were few. However those that came found the subject of the meeting very interesting. We learnt about St Wilfred who was born in 634. A monk and also a bishop, he is one of the greatest English saints, and he was outstanding in bringing about close relations between the Anglo-Saxon (Celtic) church and the Roman Catholic church. In his life time he travelled to Rome at least three times, no mean undertaking in those days, and after an eventful life was given the monasteries of Ripon and Hexham. He died in 709 and is buried at Ripon. In his lifetime he also spread the knowledge of the Benedictine Rule and helped improve the chanting of the liturgy.

In November we meet on Tuesday 19th (a few days before the annual Church Christmas Fair on Saturday November 23rd), and will discuss our stall as well as organising our Christmas lunch in December and hopefully planning the next year's programme too – a busy meeting!

As usual we will be having a Quality Bric-a-Brac stall at the fair and all contributions are welcome. If you need anything collected please ring me on 01342 712478 or bring it to the Smallfield Hall on the evening of Friday 22 November. We will be at the hall from 6.30-7.30pm on Friday evening but I am afraid we cannot accept any items on the day of the fair.

BURSTOW AND SMALLFIELD WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

Carolyn Last, President of Outwood WI, was the speaker at this month's meeting. Carolyn has a special interest in hats and over the previous two decades or so has collected 1,115 different types of hat. Up until the advent of mass car ownership most people wore hats – in fact you were not considered completely dressed if you left the house without some form of headgear.

Hats denote rank or profession as well as being an item to keep your head warm and your hair tidy. Amongst her collection Carolyn showed us some examples of country women's bonnets from the 1880s which would have been worn for working in the fields – they had been made quite beautiful with very simple sewing techniques but of course their main function was to keep the sun off your face and neck.

There was a gentleman's smoking cap – red velvet with silver decoration; a boudoir cap; and also the sort of everyday hat that we can all recall our grandmothers wearing. Carolyn has also collected headwear from around the world including Peruvian knitted hats, a headdress with metallic ornaments and hangings from Balukistan, a child bride's headdress from NE Pakistan and a Tibetan monk's huge cockscomb of a head covering.

The items that created the most interest, though, were the legal wigs and a Billingsgate fish porter's hat which was made of leather and weighed a considerable amount before the four or so boxes of fish were added to be transported by the porter on his head. After a question and answer session tea and cake was served.

Burstow and Smallfield WI have started a collection box for Horley Food Bank – in fact the box was full to the brim so a new box will be at the next meeting and closer to Christmas all the items collected will be taken to Horley.

The next meeting on 12 November will be the AGM. After a jacket potato and fillings luncheon at 12.30 the AGM will take place, followed by a quiz and tea and cake and of course a chat.

The December meeting will be on 10 December 2019 at 2 pm at Smallfield Church Hall. Redehall Road. Smallfield – the entertainment will be Duo Decimus, hand bell ringers, and of course there will be Christmas cake and mince pies with the afternoon tea.

We return in the New Year on 14 January at 2 pm and the speaker will be from Saint Catherine's Hospice.




