

RECTOR'S RAMBLINGS

Last month I led an end of year leavers' assembly for Burstow School. For Burstow

School, but not in Burstow School. I was in my garden, filming the assembly for them to watch in school. A whole school year has gone by without me being able to go into the school. I would never have thought when I filmed my leavers' assembly last July that I would still be unable to go in a year later.

Last year I showed them my vegetable patch and I did the same again this year. I said how another year had passed and here I was again, talking about my vegetables – like my assembly last year but different too. Another year and things have changed, my garden is similar to last year but different: new seeds have been planted, new plants have grown. And I said how it was the same for them: that despite all we've been through and all the difficulties we've faced, new seeds of learning had been planted in them and they have grown – grown not just in size but grown in knowledge, grown in understanding, grown as a person. A lot of growing had happened over the last year – for my garden and for them.

I then said that a year is the length of time it takes for the earth to circle the sun – whether you measure that from January 1st or the end of one school year to another – and how that was like the circle of life, which is also the name of a song from the musical 'The Lion King':

From the day we arrive on the planet and blinking, step into the sun, There's more to see than can ever be seen, more to do than can ever be done. There's far too much to take in here, more to find than can ever be found But the sun rolling high through the sapphire sky Keeps great and small on the endless round.

It's the Circle of Life and it moves us all Through despair and hope, through faith and love Till we find our place on the path unwinding In the Circle, the Circle of Life.

And then I said, as the earth circles round the sun, the seasons change. Summer turns to Autumn, Autumn to Winter and Winter to Spring, and for my garden Spring is the beginning of the circle of life. Spring is when plants 'spring' out from the ground. That's why the season is called Spring.

I showed them a metal spring and pointed out how, if you look at a spring end on, you just see a circle, but if you look at it from the side you see a spiral. And I said that the circle of life is more like a spiral. Another year has gone round and they have grown, upwards in height and grown up in other ways as well. And growth means change — and that's a simple fact of life.

I finished by reading out from a Fathers' Day card that Hannah, one of my daughters, sent me last year and which I keep on my desk. In it she said:

'To Dad Happy Fathers' Day I always remember you saying the following words to me and I always appreciate them:

To live is to learn
To learn is to grow
To grow is to live
And so the circle of life begins again.'

And then she added:

'Thank you for always having the right words to say.'

I think a lot about my words, what I say to people, what I say in my sermons and what I say in these Rector's Ramblings. People are often telling me they read what I write here in the magazine. I hope you find my words food for thought and that they might just in some small way help you along the path unwinding in the circle of life – because even though your time and my time at primary school might be a long time ago now, we're never too old to grow!

Focus on...

SMALLFIELD CLUB AND READING ROOM

As activities get going and the club can look forward again, Eileen Sowter and Ann Rumens help us look back at the club's history

Way back in 1922 two Smallfield residents, Mr Sherlock and Mr Penfold, wanted somewhere where they could meet socially so they started up a club in Smallfield Church Hall. But Smallfield landowner Mr King gave some land in New Road for today's club to be built. Smallfield Club has been on its present site since 1924. George Sherlock became the first Secretary of a long line leading to today's Secretary, Roy Rumens.

One of the original rule books, dating from 1931, confirms that 'Beer, stout and cyder but no other intoxicating liquors, shall be supplied for consumption on the Club premises'. And the following rule insists that 'No fighting, gambling, swearing, drunkenness, or other offensive conduct shall be permitted in the Club'!

In the early days, the current reading room at the back of the building did not exist – this was built on later and offers a quieter space for people to sit in. The main doors were on the front and there was an old coal burner beside the front doors with the chimney going up through the roof and there were two full-size billiard tables in the main room in the middle of the floor."When we had dances." recalls Eileen Sowter, "They used to throw Epsom Salts on the floor and they danced round the billiard tables. The seating was old bus seats on beer crates right the way down both sides. As a kid I remember when I wasn't very old I went to sleep on a seat and I fell off. I can still remember the chap's face when he found me and picked me up to put me back on the seat!"

The club is and always has been funded by membership and it is

owned by the members – every member has a share in the club. In the 1930s the cost of membership was 1/6 a quarter, or 5/- for the year. Membership today is still only £15 a year (after a £30 joining fee; less for OAPs and reductions for couples).





Annual outings were a popular feature of club life. Setting off in a Plumridge coach to the coast, they would stop half way to open the boot for some refreshment! Pictured here on the 1961 outing are: John Doe, Les Cross, David Ford, Roy Sowter, Chris Till, Don Sowter and Ernie Ford. Another regular outing was to the Derby Sunday Fair in Epsom.

In addition to the bar and reading room facilities, the club runs a number of events with outside entertainers, which hopefully will begin again soon. Also popular is the annual OAP dinner and, more recently, a Christmas party of members' children and grandchildren has been running for five years now. But like so many other places, the club had to remain closed for months. It opened in July and then closed again in November. It was hoped it would reopen for Christmas and all the decorations were up ready but it never happened. It left a big hole in everyone's life.

But while the club was shut, the maintenance had to carry on. Roy Rumens used Continued overleaf

to come in regularly even though the heating was off and he and another committee member Peter Adcock could only stay an hour as it was so cold. They painted doors and did repairs to keep on top of everything while the club waited.

Bingo was started at the club in the 1950s by Eileen's mother, with all the prizes laid out on one of the snooker tables. The numbers were called from balls which popped out of a machine but Eileen recalls that one night the spring in the machine broke and the balls flew out everywhere! Bingo has just started up again; the meat raffle has restarted, and there is pool again on Sundays. After a very quiet and challenging year, there is life in the Club again.

With the lifting of restrictions on 19 August and the inevitable rise in cases of those infected by Covid 19,1 continue to urge you all to take reasonable safeguarding measures to assist in protecting both yourselves and others.

It is probable that the Vaccination Centre at Centenary Hall will cease operating in mid-August and that the suggested booster jabs will be given at Birchwood Surgery in Horley though this is not yet confirmed. Centenary Hall will then open again for public and associated group use but for the time being you will be required to wear masks at entry and within the access and toilet areas.

The main meeting hall will remain out of use to allow the installation of a new floor surface to replace the already worn floor, the deterioration of which has been accelerated by the passing of over 30,000 pairs of feet! Our thanks are proffered once again to those members of the NHS and our great band of volunteers for all their hard work and dedication in the application of the vaccination programme.

Our plans for the Queens' Platinum Jubilee celebrations next year are still at a very early stage. However it is apparent that this will be a joint effort between Burstow, Horne and Outwood Parish Councils and the churches of the Windmill United Benefice (Burstow, Horne and Outwood). As ever I appeal for helpers to assist in the planning and operation of this forthcoming event and those willing should please notify their details to our Parish Clerk, Jeannie Ryan at Centenary Hall.

Just a reminder that Council is in recess through August however the Council Office will continue to be manned during normal working hours.

Last month I stated that 'Now is not the time for complacency' and I believe that that statement is even more important under forthcoming circumstances. Please all continue to observe and follow government guidelines to preserve our wellbeing.

THIS MONTH ON THE FARM

The latest update from Broadlands Farm, is from Sarah, rather than Ian McCubbine. Sarah explains why...



I'm afraid you will have to make do with the ramblings of a farmer's wife this month! The weather has turned for the good and the farmer is now working flat-out during daylight hours (and night-time, if the moisture in the air is not too bad) to bring in the hay harvest.

Making hay is notoriously difficult in England, due to the fact that it usually needs up to five clear days of hot, sunny and preferably windy days. As you will all know, if you watch the weekly weather forecast on a certain Sunday evening TV programme about the countryside, our weather is highly unpredictable and the weather forecast is quite frequently wrong! Therefore, when the weather looks set to be lovely, there is always a race against time to get the hay mown, tedded (fluffed up), rowed up, baled and brought back to the farm before the sun turns to rain. Indeed, I am writing this having just driven through the worst downpour I have ever driven through, over in Tunbridge Wells, looking out the window and hoping the thunderstorms keep themselves over there; a farmer with wet hay is a very grumpy farmer! If hay is

even slightly damp when it is baled, it can sweat and heat up in the middle. This can lead to selfcombustion and barn fires.

Extremely relieved to have pulled into the farm drive this afternoon after the awful drive through the downpour, I hit upon another issue. As I drove up



to the farm gate, the whole gate was covered with an enormous swarm of bees! Luckily I didn't have to get out of the car to open the gate as I have one of those bleeper things. We have bees on both Broadlands Farm and our other farm in Horley. According to one of our lovely bee-keepers, Raouf, the Smallfield bees quite often leave the hive en-masse to go and have a drink from the pond!

Our other bee-keeper, Gill, is having a year off from bee-keeping after having lost her colonies in the bad winter weather. However, she had still managed



to amass lots of delicious honey which she was saving for a special occasion. That occasion just happened to be our daughter's wedding which finally took place last weekend, after numerous postponements due to Covid. Gill spent pain-staking hours decanting the farm honey into little pots which we gifted to our guests as favours, alongside Amie and Stuart's home-made hedgerow gin! The favours were a very popular choice!

The wedding was absolutely fantastic; all guests took lateral flow tests to ensure the safety of themselves and others and the weather held off enough

for us to enjoy the wedding properly with the marquee sides taken off; apologies for the noise! Farmer lan even managed a Dirty Dancing airlift without a mishap!

Looking out of the window, it has just started to rain, so I don't think he'll be dancing tonight!















The community garden at the Centenary Hall was looking quite overgrown and neglected at the start of the year and we have been working on it to bring it back to life.

It's been a case of two steps forward and one back due to the prolonged wet weather in May and June because when we were able to get back to it we found that the weeds had reappeared with a vengeance on areas previously cleared, especially the dreaded burdock!

We are enjoying working on the garden although it is still very much a work in progress. There are some really beautiful plants and if you can wear your 'weedy blinkers' you will find it a lovely place to sit and watch the many butterflies and bees that are attracted to the area.

The two timber frames at the front which were continually hit and moved by cars have been made into raised beds and filled with earth during the recent working party day by Rachel and Martin We have now planted these up with evergreens and roses to improve visibility and provide a more attractive and obvious entrance to the garden.

Whilst working on the garden we have been encouraged by the many positive and appreciative comments from people using the car park.

We hope you will feel able to use and enjoy the garden. Come and sit a while, it is a lovely place to be and you will see the improvements over the year as we get to grip with the weeds and the garden evolves with the seasons.

GOING GREEN-TRAPPING SUNSHINE IN A JAR

This month in her series on living in a more environmentally way, Lauma Kazusa looks the issue of food waste

It is the time of the year when gardens, orchards, and fields are full of delightful fruit and vegetables. All this bounty around us — lovely apples, bright tomatoes, supersize courgettes, fragrant quince, funny-looking carrots, and so much more.

Every autumn, I catch myself looking through recipe books for inspiration to try something different, finding new ways to preserve all this goodness for longer – jams, chutneys, fruit cheeses, pickles, cordials. How can we stretch this to go further? How to minimise food waste along the way? In recent years I have been trying to find new 'old' ways of preserving food to cut back on energy consumption linked to the preparation and storage. There were no fridges in the olden days.

Food waste has a substantial environmental impact on greenhouse gas emissions – namely methane that contributes to climate change. According to various estimates, we in the UK waste 6.7 million tonnes of food each year, roughly one-third of all food bought. Less than a fifth is so-called unavoidable food waste – bones, eggshells, tea bags, fruit stones. It also includes possibly avoidable things such as vegetable peelings and bread crusts.


Good news, all being well it looks as though we will be able to restart our meetings in October. These will, as before, be from 7pm until 9pm on the first Tuesday of the month in the Centenary Hall. We think it wise that only those who have had both jabs should attend and that the use of masks and hand sanitiser be continued. Our first

meetings will be:

■ Tuesday 5 October when we will hear from Terence Henderson on 'Random Jottings of a Concorde Pilot'. Concorde was, of course, the world's only successful supersonic airliner.

■ Tuesday 2 November will be about cross-channel car ferrying with 'The Silver City Story' from Paul Ross.

Most people probably know that Frenchman Louis Blériot was the first person to cross the English Channel in an aeroplane. At 4.41am on 25 July



1909 he took off from Calais and 36½ minutes later landed, albeit rather heavily, close to Dover Castle. He won the Daily Mail £1,000 prize for the first cross-channel flight, the equivalent of £120,000 today. In the early-morning misty conditions mid-Channel when he could see nothing ahead, he wished he had

fitted a compass, but just in case he came down in the water it is said he had filled the wings with ping pong balls. The aircraft was disassembled and taken to London where it was displayed in the foyer of Selfridges. It is now in a museum in Paris.

The first woman to make the crossing was the first American woman to obtain

a pilot's certificate, 37-year-old Harriet Quimby. On 16 April 1912, she took off from Dover and after 59 minutes landed on a beach about 25 miles further down the coast from Calais. She expected to become world famous but unfortunately her feat received little attention as the sinking of the Titanic the day before had totally dominated the newspapers.

Environmental impact aside, there is a financial cost – collectively, we waste £10.8 billion or about £420 per household. I am confident that we all know better ways to spend money rather than just binning it.

Some ideas on how to eat more of what we buy or grow:

- Buy and cook only what you need.
- Love your leftovers fridge and freezer are your friends.
- Share your homegrown produce with others.
- Test out food sharing apps, e.g., Olio maybe your neighbour wants those last chocolates.
- Try preserving food; if you are unsure how, ask a friend or neighbour who can help. Provide the ingredients and let them keep some of the preserves.
- Have fun with zero-waste cooking cut back on vegetable peelings; try new recipes banana skin smoothie, onion skin powder into meat dishes, carrot top pesto, or other creative ideas.

And remember, there are no wonky fruit and vegetables – merely differently shaped parcels of goodness.

In reality the first to cross the Channel by air were two balloonists, Frenchman Jean-Pierre Blanchard and American John Jeffries who on 7th January 1785 flew a gas balloon from Dover landing 6 miles south of Calais about $2^{1}/_{2}$ hours later. At one point the balloon got so low that even after they had discarded all their bags of sand ballast and other items, they were still sinking so jettisoned their heavy frock coats and arrived in France very cold and almost naked. Local magistrates loaned suitable clothing for a reception in Calais Town Hall.
