RECTOR'S RAMBLINGS

July brings us what has become known as 'Freedom Day'. On 19 July (postponed from

21 June) we will, if all goes to plan (famous last words!), be free of the Covid restrictions, the rules and regulations that have governed our lives for so long now. I wonder how you feel about that?

And you might wonder what the difference between a rule and a regulation is! If you look in the dictionary the answer is not much – if anything. They both come from the same Latin word regula meaning a rule. We associate rules and regulations with a list of dos and don'ts and we are very familiar with the ones that have governed us over the last 18 months. Such rules and regulations have formed the framework of the three lockdowns we have been through and have in so many ways curtailed our freedom to do so many of the things that we were used to doing. No wonder the day has become known as Freedom Day.

But let's think a little more broadly about freedom and what it means to us – specifically what it means to us in a spiritual sense. There's a prayer in the Book of Common Prayer (it's the second collect in Morning Prayer) that begins like this:

O God,

who art the author of peace and lover of concord, in knowledge of whom standeth our eternal life, whose service is perfect freedom.

I've always liked that prayer and always remember my father saying it in church. As a boy it amused me that God should be such a fan of a supersonic aircraft! But leaving concord and Concorde aside, the truth that a life lived in the service of God brings freedom is an important truth to reflect on. And when I say 'a live lived in the service of God', I'm not simply referring to those who have made the religious life their vocation, people such as monks and nuns and clergy like me, but to each and every one of us, however religious or unreligious we may think ourselves to be.

I mentioned earlier the Latin word regula. In a monastic or convent setting it is used to describe the rule of a religious order, but that sort of rule is not about having to obey a long list of dos and don'ts. It is not about regulations but about a way of regulating your life. It is not about rules but about using a rule (in the sense of a ruler) to measure your life by. And regulating and measuring our lives is something that each of us needs to do to live our lives to their full potential.

So whatever your thoughts are about Freedom Day – maybe it can't come soon enough for you or maybe you feel a little bit anxious about it – perhaps you could think of it not just as a time when rules and regulations set by the government are lifted but also as a time to think about how your life is regulated and measured. A time to take stock, a time to reflect on all that you personally and all of us as a local community, nation and world have been through. A time to ask yourself: Am I living my life in the best way I am able?

There's a modern paraphrase of Psalm 23 that uses the image of a pacemaker to illustrate what I've been talking about. I like the image of a pacemaker – whether that's a medical device to keep the heart beating as it should or in the sporting world a person who makes sure the race is run at the right speed. You might like to use this version of Psalm 23 to help you reflect on how your life is measured and regulated, so here it is:

The Lord is my pacemaker —
I shall not rush.

He makes me stop and rest for quiet intervals:
He provides me with images of stillness,
Which restore my serenity.
He leads me in ways of efficiency
Through calmness of mind,
and His guidance is peace.
Even though I have a great many things
To accomplish each day,
I will not fret —
for His Presence is here:
His timelessness,
His importance
will keep me in balance.

Disappointed, as I am sure we all are, at the latest announcement that somewhat inevitably the government has decided against the lifting of restrictions for a further period of time, I urge you all to maintain your vigilance in assisting to prevent the increasing spread in this virulent disease.

Your Council continues to offer use of the Centenary Hall to the NHS as a vaccination centre and will continue to do so in the event of any decision taken over the possibility of booster jabs later in the year, possibly in a revised location such as a marquee or the meeting room as we would like to reopen the hall to the public in late September subject to prevailing restrictions. Our thanks are proffered once again to those members of the NHS and our great band of volunteers for all their hard work and dedication in the application of the vaccination programme. Nearly 30,000 patients have been vaccinated in Smallfield and over one million in Surrey.

I am very happy to announce that the memorial bench dedicated to Peter Hart is now in place in the QEII playing field and planting has been carried out by his family to enhance the location (see pictures on cover and on p19). A further bench is to be installed shortly to replace the damaged bench on the green space at the corner of Plough Road to be dedicated to all those members of our community who have lost their lives due to Covid during the pandemic. The Centenary sign has been restored and will shortly be in position on a new oak post.

Council and committees have met recently in person and will continue to do so. Dates of meetings are published on village notice boards and on our website which is at present being rebuilt and should come on line and be accessible to all very shortly. After several months of negotiation, the Department of Education has finally agreed to our terms of lease for the proposed Car Park for which we have planning approval to be sited on the school playing field in Redehall Road. Hopefully the assigned lease will be in place following acceptance by the school governors in July.

Now is not the time for complacency. Please all continue to observe and follow government guide lines to preserve our wellbeing, take care, stay safe.

News from the 1st Burstow Scouts

The Scouts were sent off to complete the Climbing Challenge, which included a mixture of obstacles.

The young people returned to our campsite and enjoyed a drink and some biscuits to help refuel them before we headed to Blackland Farm's Shop to purchase souvenirs and sweets. This was followed by a scavenger hunt, where in teams they tried to find objects, or people, for each letter of the alphabet. With some excitement, we got to lunchtime and we all enjoyed our packed lunches.

In the afternoon we spilt into two groups. The Beavers took turns on the Bungee Trampoline while strapped into a harness attached to bungee cords. The Beavers jumped so high with a couple even completing a back flip in midair! They finished the afternoon by playing in the woods. Meanwhile the Cubs and Scouts headed down to Weir Wood Reservoir to do canoeing. On arrival they were given a safety briefing before been let on to the water in their boats. They all ended up in the water to cool off.

Everyone had a great day. My thanks as always goes to our wonderful leadership team who support the young people so well.

GOING GREEN – A LOVE AFFAIR WITH PLASTIC

This month in her series on living in a more environmentally way, Lauma Kazusa looks the pros and cons of plastic

There is no hiding away from the plastic in our lives. It is a love-hate relationship. We love the convenience but hate the litter and microplastics invading the food chain. We depend on plastics in so many ways in food packaging, the medical sector, cars, textiles, and so on. It easy to get emotional about plastics — roadside litter, polluted waterways and beaches, strangled wildlife, the invisible microplastics are everywhere. There is no denying it is a problem that we need to tackle collectively on a global scale. What is less spoken about — why do we use plastics in the first place and what are the benefits?

There are many types of plastics, each with different properties. Often alternative materials are available, but this does not mean they are necessarily more environmentally friendly. All plastics could be recycled if only there was a demand. Drinks bottles are easily collected and very much in demand – British milk bottles are some of the most recycled plastic bottles in the world. Plastic bottles are lighter than glass or aluminium equivalents. Furthermore, plastics melt at a lower temperature (250-300°C); thus, less energy is needed to produce new bottles, which equals fewer emissions. However, we need to improve our recycling rates and demand recycled content in new bottles or even reusable plastic bottles.

An average modern car contains about 300kg of plastic but this makes its overall weight lower and allows greater fuel efficiency. Household appliances and electronic gadgets are mostly plastic, which makes them more affordable for the masses. Plastic bags – from a carbon emission perspective – are better than paper or cotton alternatives. However, it is essential to reuse your bags,

plastic or otherwise. This is the only way to reduce the need for new bags.

100 % PLASTIC

I fully support those who want to avoid and reduce plastic in their lives. However, please remember that replacing it with an alternative does not always make it better for the environment. The hard truth is that we need to curb our demand for all new things irrespective of their material, and this is at odds with the fact that our economy relies on growth and consumption.

Is this a scam?

In the May Parish News we published the story of a Smallfield resident who had been scammed at the hands of people who had rung claiming to be from BT. This prompted a phone call in response from Rita Hendy who was very amused that she had just been reading the scam story when her phone had rung. It was apparently someone ringing from HMRC, speaking in an 'English civil servant voice' and saying that if she didn't press 1 she would be arrested very soon. Well, said Rita, I didn't press one and my doorbell hasn't rung yet! Rita was right not to respond because as we said in the May issue, none of the large companies or Government organisations will ever ask for money or your private details over the phone, by an email out of the blue or by text. And yet more and more scammers seem to be giving it a go. Here are just some of the exmples I have had in the past month...

HMRC Income Tax Return

'Dear burstownews@btinternet.com, you are eligible for a 240.29 (GBP) tax refund due to the COVID-19 outbreak. In order to receive your refund, you need to provide us the information nedded to receive your payment...'
Easy to spot this was fake – so far as I am aware the parish news is not eligible to pay income tax! And wouldn't the UK Government write £240?

Your Royal Mail parcel

'Delivery of your item was stopped due to the wrong address. Click below and make the necessary correction with valid details to receive your package' Royal Mail contacts are tricky as we are all often waiting for something or other. But a genuine delivery would know your name and not just say 'Dear Consignee' as this one did. If you are not sure, ask your postman!

Hermes

'Sorry we missed you, our driver will attempt to redeliver tomorrow. Please reschedule and cover the 1.99 GBP service fee'

Again, Hermes and all delivery companies do not ask for money and especially not by text. And again, wouldn't a genuine contact write $\pounds 1.99$ not 1.99 GBP?

HSBC

'A payment was attempted from a new device. If this was not you please visit...' Easy to know this is incorrect as I don't have an HSBC account. If a scammer strikes lucky and you do have the relevant account, don't respond to a message like this but ring your bank, or a friend or family member to see what they think.

Amazon

An American voice announces 'This is Am-a-zon...'
I can't tell you more as I always put the phone down at that point!

Stay safe, everyone, and do get in touch if you are at all uncertain about contacts such as these. Judith Calver



AVIATION GROUP

At last there is light at the end of the tunnel as it looks as though the Centenary Hall will return to more normal use in September/October. As long as restrictions on indoor meetings are lifted, then our first meeting will be Tuesday 5 October, which will be 'Random Jottings of a Concorde Pilot' by Terence Henderson.

In the 1930s the best way to travel long distances by air was in a spacious flying boat – to Africa or the Far East in an Imperial Airways Empire one,

built at Rochester in Kent, or to cross the Pacific from California in a Pan American Boeing Clipper. Transatlantic Clipper flights had just started in the summer of 1939 and continued during the war for VIPs including Sir Winston



Churchill when he went to meet President Roosevelt.

By the 1970s large flying boats had all but disappeared except for Antilles Air Boats in the Caribbean. In August 1976, (the legendary **hot** summer) the owner Charles Blair, who was married to the Irish actress Maureen O'Hara, brought one of his four engined Short Sandringham 'boats', a conversion of the WW2 Sunderland anti-submarine aircraft, to Ireland and the UK to offer joy rides. My wife and I were fortunate to get £16 (£135 in todays money) a time seats

NEWS FROM CLAIRE COUTINHO MP

In her latest regular update for the Parish News, our local MP outlines what she has been involved in recently

Like many of you, I had the pleasure of getting my first dose of the vaccine recently. I pay testament to all involved and am so grateful for the role they've played in getting us on the path to normal life.

Now that we can get out and about, I've been checking in on our local businesses like the Kindred Bakery in Whyteleafe and three of our fantastic local pubs – the Bell in Outwood, the Botley Hill Farmhouse in Warlingham, and the Station Pub in Nutfield. The food was, as always, delicious, and it was wonderful to hear that residents have been flocking back to support them.

It was terrific to finally visit East Surrey's new Youth Hub recently too, which has a moving presence in Caterham, Oxted and Redhill, and I was delighted to be joined by the Minister for Employment, Mims Davies MP, as well as several local leaders. We had the chance to speak to Tanya and Grace, who shared their experiences of being two of the first people to use the Youth Hub. Best of luck to them both – I can't wait to hear about their progress in the coming weeks.

I also caught up with the Chief Executive of Gatwick Airport, Stewart Wingate, recently. One of the issues raised was making green list travel easier and we also talked about the importance of getting international agreement on travel arrangements. I also raised concerns with the council about access for cyclists to the airport and I'm pleased to say consultations and workshops are currently taking place and I expect to hear more from them soon.

Another focus of mine this month has been HGVs in Smallfield. Burstow. Outwood and Horne. I recently met with the Roads Minister, Baroness Charlotte Vere, to discuss the local concerns and proposals I put to the Department for Transport following the public meeting I held in January. And I am so delighted to share that, after my question to the Prime Minister on the topic at PMQs, the Government will be formally reviewing the role of the Traffic Commissioner – which was one of our key asks. I am also pleased to share that the Government will be bringing forward legislation this year to give local authorities enforcement powers against moving traffic offences. Crucially, the Minister agreed this will include HGVs using the wrong roads and ignoring 'unsuitable for HGV' signs.

Finally, it's been a long time coming but I know how much we are all looking forward to 19 July – I do hope you're all able to spend some time this summer catching up with much-loved family and friends.

for a one-hour flight out of Studland Bay in Dorset. A launch took us from the Sandbanks chain ferry pier out to the flying boat bobbing at anchor in the bay.

The interior was arranged in small cabins, a bit like compartments on a train, we were facing each other in the lower rear eight-seat cabin. When all 30 passengers were aboard engines were started and after a power check, off we went. I'll never forget the look of horror on my wife's face as there were loud thudding noises and the water line went up the cabin window – she thought we were sinking! After some seconds as speed built up it started to skim across the water and then we were up and away. We were joined by a replica of one of the Schneider Trophy racing seaplanes as we flew at a leisurely speed low over Southsea Pier and along the South Coast. We could clearly see the traffic coming to a halt and the upturned faces of the amazed people on the ground against the backdrop of drought parched ground and dying trees. We spent much of the time admiring the view leaning on the promenade rail with a drink served by Maureen O'Hara and of course visiting the flight deck. Eventually we turned to fly round the Isle of Wight and over the Needles followed by a low flypast at Bournemouth's Hurn Airport before we splashed back down in Studland Bay – truly a flight to remember in a unique relic from the past.

You can explore the aircraft yourself as it is now in Southampton's Solent Sky Museum, just across the road from the Ocean Village Marina.
