# The Church and Churchyard

Following the Quinquennial Inspection in June 2020, the work identified in the Architect's Report remains to be addressed. Work to re-shingle the spire is the most significant requirement, however, lack of funding is an issue. The Wardens approached the Architect about seeking external funding but up until now there is no progress to report.

Routine maintenance and inspections at St Mary the Virgin, Horne have been carried out; for example, fire extinguisher and lightning conductor checks, the boiler serviced, oil tank checked, portable electrical appliances tested, the five-yearly full electrical inspection and gutters, downpipes and drains checked and cleared.

The wardens are grateful to Bozi and Julie Mohacek for continuing their work to maintain the grass and hedges in the churchyard and for generally keeping an eye on things. Thank you to the regular strimming team for their dedication to keeping things tidy in places that the mowers cannot reach. New team members are always welcome so if you think that you can join the team to help, please have a word with the wardens or David Spruce. Thank you to the many others who come along unseen to work in the churchyard as and when they are able. We notice when you've been and it's much appreciated.

Our church interior cleaning regime is important as it not only ensures that St Mary's looks as good as possible but also is a way of regularly inspecting the fabric of St Mary's to identify items that might need attention and damage that needs repair. Thank you to Suzanne Robinson for organising the cleaning rota, leading the cleaning team and especially for her organisation and leading of the winter clean on December 30<sup>th</sup> 2023. Thank you to the cleaning team who turn out regularly to do an excellent job and to those who answered the appeal to do a winter deep clean which made the church so much cleaner and brighter.

The wardens thank Lauma Kazusa who coordinates the flower arrangers at St Mary the Virgin, continues to promote an awareness of important environmental issues to consider when providing church flowers. At St Mary, we discourage the use of floral foam in arrangements as it is a toxic microplastic that is harmful to people, animals and pollutes waterways. ### Horne Parochial School Building

The wardens have addressed minor ad hoc repairs, mainly to the north facing roof areas and regular maintenance.

The Horne Parochial School Building eco-energy efficiency project has been completed so now the building is well insulated, has replacement double glazed windows and doors, eco energy lighting, an air-to-air heat pump installation and commissioned solar powered energy creation.

The final step will be to link up with the national grid so we can generate some income to offset the church heating costs ... we look forward to that!

The PCC is grateful to the headteacher and staff at Butterfly Nursery who have worked with us throughout this project to work around disruption to their routine at various times during the project work.

This work has made the building energy efficient and is the first stage of our project to make the site fit for purpose as a resource for church, nursery and community use. The project was funded by the proceeds from the sale of Newchapel Hall set aside for this purpose.
